**Opening Reading**: Vocation by William Stafford The dream the world is having about itself includes a trace on the plains of the Oregon trail, a groove in the grass my father showed us all one day while meadowlarks were trying to tell something better about to happen.

I dreamed the trace to the mountains, over the hills, and there a girl who belonged wherever she was. But then my mother called us back to the car: she was afraid; she always blamed the place, the time, anything my father planned.
