INTRODUCTION TO INDIVIDUALITY IN COMMUNITY

We deceive ourselves if we think we can be grasped by life's meaning, or a sense of the holy, before we find and are found by our fellow human beings. There is no sense of the sacredness of life, no sense of the holiness of sheer existence that does not come first through another person. Human encounter is common: human acceptance is rare. Religious community is people reaching through all the facades people carefully place around them, people embracing people where they live and struggle, what Henry Nelson Wieman calls 'creative interchange.' The most radical contribution religion can make to human living is that it enables people to experience community as starkly as hunger ... Where life has a chance, we are in caring and in mutual need. When we are most alive, we are in the presence of someone or something intensely with us ... Nothing is experienced except in relation. It is participation in a religious community that stabs our consciousness into this awareness in the midst of a society that knows nothing about it.

anguish of defeat, The tender touch of those who call us friend; The exuberant joy of birth, The empty space in our hearts when a loved one dies, The warm embrace of comrades who welcome us to the celebration of life; The questions that persist and perplex and do not yield to our needs for answers, The shining moments when the sun slants across our dim meandering path and illuminates the way, The helplessness we feel in a world that sometimes presents only problems, The high joy when some small victory for humanity is won and we have helped it happen; In all our moments of doubt and despair, of problem and pain, Let us remember the common lot shared by our human kin.

In all our times of truth and triumph, of faith and fortitude, Let us celebrate what we share. We are, after all, in this together.

The following is adapted from Martin Buber:

We enter into relation. We mingle. We want to confirm one another in genuine conversation. We imagine the real, each imagining what another is at this very moment wishing, feeling, perceiving, thinking, and not as a detached content but in the other's very reality, as a living process in this person. We each, perhaps secretly and bashfully, watch for a 'yes' that allows each to be and that comes from one person to another. Our heavenly bread of self-being is passed from one person to another. We want to let no dishonesty arise between ourselves and the other. To resist dishonesty is our essential courage. The will to be what we really are and nothing else is stirred. We practice directness. As we hear the other speak, we hear the voice of our own suppressed longing. We regard the other as who the other is, aware of our differences, affirming the person with whom we speak. Mutuality in speech arises between us. With the most intensive stirring of our being, we imagine the real, becoming whole and unique and aware of the other's wholeness and uniqueness. Each says what each has to say. Here is a partnership, a genuine meeting, a communion, a community.
