"Where do we come from? What are we? Where are we going?" These words make up the title and first phrase of one of our hymns (#1003 in "Singing the Journey"). These words actually come from Paul Gauguin, a 19th century French Post-Impressionist painter. His painting, "Where Do We Come From? What Are We? Where Are We Going?" was the inspiration for our hymn expressing transcending mystery and wonder in the world. The painting can be seen and read about on-line at the Museum of Fine Arts Boston: http://tinyurl.com/gauguin2015. Gauguin painted this piece in order to express his thoughts of the beginning and end of life. It is these questions into the meaning of life which we all live with.

In our hymnal the questions are answered, albeit in the Unitarian Universalist fashion of opening doors rather than closing them. The answer is, "Mystery. Mystery. Life is a riddle and a mystery." At the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Newark we are delving into mystery as our April worship theme. The concept of "mystery" is easily overwhelming and nebulous - by definition. So there will be opportunities to approach the eternal questions from different sides.

Our spiritual practice for the month is to look at your different experiences of mystery. Through our lives we approach mystery and wonder with different expectations. One large difference is when we are children versus when we are adults. I invite you to explore what "child-like" and "adult-like" wonder mean for you and which (if either) you prefer.
