CHALICE LIGHTING AND OPENING WORDS

From The Once and Future King by T. H. White, this admonition from the wizard Merlin, to the young Arthur:

The best thing for being sad is to learn something. That's the only thing that never fails. You may grow old and trembling in your anatomies, you may lie awake at night listening to the disorder of your veins, you may miss your only love, you may see the world about you devastated by evil lunatics, or know your honour trampled in the sewers of baser minds. DEFINITIONS FOR FOCUSING

Dither: To be indecisive; to act nervously or indecisively; to hesitate because of inability to make a decision; British to be uncertain or indecisive, US to be in an agitated state.

Key Concept: Indecisive

Dabble: To take part in an activity in a way that is not serious; to undertake something superficially or without serious intent.

Dilettante: a person who cultivates an area of interest without real commitment or knowledge. A person who seems to be interested in a subject, but whose understanding of it is not very deep or serious. Synonym = dabbler. Usually disapproving.

Key Concepts: Lack of seriousness; superficiality
