- What kinds of paradoxes do you deal with spiritually (i.e. the presence/absence of god? Destiny vs. free will? etc.)?
- How do you wrestle with paradox around questions of identity (race, gender, sexual preference, class, age, physical ability)?
- In what ways can we become better equipped to live with paradox—our own and other people's? Is the ability to live with paradox something we come to through experiences or are there practices that can help us cultivate this ability?
- In his sermon Fred said that if your religion can't handle paradox, it's not a religion, it's anesthesia. Is our UU faith uniquely qualified to help us cultivate a comfort with paradox? Do you see places where it fails?
