MOMENT OF SILENCE

OPENING WORDS

CHECK-IN (up to 20 to 30 minutes total with up to 2 to 3 minutes per person)

TOPIC AND SHARING (up to 70 minutes for readings, questions, a few minutes for reflection and making notes if desired, individual sharing, optional open discussion at the end if the group agrees, with an optional 5 minute break about midway in the session)

READINGS

Out of 5.8 billion people in the world, the majority of them are certainly not believers in Buddhism. We can't argue with them, tell them they should be believers. No! Impossible! - 1. What differences do you encounter in your own or other communities that you find interesting, refreshing or enjoyable? What needs do these differences meet for you?
- 2. What differences in your own or other communities do you find to be challenging, uncomfortable, frustrating or distressing? What needs or values of yours are not met by these differences?
- 3. Share an example of a change in understanding you experienced when you viewed different beliefs or practices as strategies which people use to meet their needs.
- 4. The 4th UU Principle is "A free and responsible search for truth and meaning". What has been your experience when you and others reach different conclusions?

SHARING (up to 6 to 8 minutes each without interruption, depending on the time available, with optional open discussion at the end after all have shared)

ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS (up to 5-10 minutes)

- -Confirm next meeting date, time, location, and topic.
- -Consider discussing the service project.
- -Other

LIKES (celebrations, gratitudes, appreciations for needs met) and WISHES (mournings, requests, acknowledgements of needs not met)/CHECK-OUT (a few words or phrases from each who wants to share, up to 5 minutes total)

CLOSING WORDS (2 minutes for words, and closing)
