FOCUS: "WELLSPINGS OF OUR RELIGIOUS VALUES"

I think there's an assumption that the wellsprings of our religious values and ethical behavior comes from our participation in the community and belief systems of our churches. I think that's true for all of us in our small group. The concern I've heard from parents throughout my ministry is: What's happening to our children as so many of them drop away from church during or after high school? What's happening in the spiritual lives of our grandchildren when our children don't attend church as adults and therefore the grandchildren have no church experience or religious acculturation at all? Where will they get their values? What values will they get? What are the benefits and losses of an unchurched life?

Our various religions, denominations, and sects (Christianity, Judaism, Islam, Buddhism, etc.) all offer community, community service, a sense of shared values, a set of ethics, history, stories, and rites and rituals. They have a rich history of stirring music, of religious education, along with their differing ways of nourishing spirituality. They have engaged us with the big questions of who we are, why we are here, and how we should act.

If that is not the road our grandchildren will travel, where will they find community, how will they nurture their spiritual lives?

Some questions:

What does it mean to be "religious?" Or, "spiritual?"

What did you learn/experience in your childhood church? Your church experience as an adult?

What are the values you hold to be most important? Were they learned in church or elsewhere?

Is church participation necessary to lead a rich, full life?

Is religious/cultural osmosis enough to sustain us?

What are the secular institutions or resources that play a similar role as the church?
